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
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
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Visit Discovery Centres and Museums

Dear Parents,

C ometimes we adults overlook the ready re-sources in our built environment designed to excite and stimulate children's curiosity. I recently attended the Discovery Awards for science and innovation here in Halifax in support of the Discovery Centre. Before that, I spent a brief visit in Barbados and noted that not only had the Barbados National Museum made great strides upgrading its displays, but had added a small, wonderful discovery centre for children.

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One way to motivate children about history, science, and the natural world is to take them to discovery centres and museums. At the recent Discovery Centre event, a grade ten school student received the youth award. He credited his parents who fostered in him a love for the life and space sciences that was nurtured throughout his childhood by frequent visits to the Discovery Centre.

A few years ago, I was in a group that chaperoned elementary kids on a visit to the new Discovery Centre, opened on the Halifax waterfront since 2017. It's an interactive science museum whose mission is to stimulate interest, enjoyment, and understanding of science and technology. The children were thrilled and we did not have enough time to explore all the themed galleries. The Centre's regular hours are currently Wednesday through Sunday, 9:00 am-4:00 pm. Admission charges are: adults \$15 and children \$12. Money well spent!

Another gem for all ages in Halifax is the Museum of Natural History at 1747 Summer St. Admission charges range from about \$4.00 for children to \$6.30 for adults. It's responsible for collecting and recording artifacts of cultural significance to Nova Scotia as well as promoting the province's natural landscape. I think of this Museum fondly, for my son's grade three teacher borrowed owl kits for biology projects with her classes. I followed suit a few years later using a museum kit for my grade five class.

It houses collections on archeology, ethnology, mammals, and marine life. Children can see Mi'kmaq artifacts, sea creatures, frogs, snakes and salamanders. In the Museum's Nature Lab, naturalists introduce children to live animals and show how they are cared for. The museum's public programs include displays, walks and talks throughout the year, exploring and experiencing first-hand Nova Scotia's nature.

Children can interact with the permanent exhibit, Netukulimk, that got its name from a traditional Mi'kmaq concept that celebrates the connection and balance between the natural and human worlds.

There is definitely an issue of access to these resources, as was noted by a speaker at the award event, and I agree. Low-income parents are unable to afford frequent visits to the Discovery Centre and people living out of city locations have less access.

Still, it's important to feed our children's interests in subjects early, way before they become caught up in a too-busy school agendas, work, and academic commitments. Children love play and fun and discovery centres and museums show them how fun and learning go hand in hand.

Liberals Focus on Housing and Affordability During Fall Legislative Session

ever before under Premier Tim Houston.

Our province is home to the most dramatic rental increases and has faced the highest inflation rates in the country. From seniors to working families, Nova Scotians are struggling more than ever before to make ends meet.

The fall session of the legislature was a vehicle for our Liberal team to move the needle on these important issues for Nova Scotians. Our Liberal MLAs tabled bills that would keep more money in your pockets by lowering taxes, reducing power rates, increasing heating assistance rebates, and introducing a universal school lunch program for students.

The current government has ignored the affordability crisis plaguing people across the province. The Premier has cut the Heating Assistance Rebate Program, reduced eligibility for rent supplements and has frozen income assistance, all while bringing in an additional \$2 billion in revenue.

At the centre of the affordability crisis is the housing crisis. Pressure from our Opposition MLAs resulted in the government finally releasing their long-overdue housing strategy, but we were disappointed that strategy was not able to meaningfully address the most pressing issue of the

t is more expensive to live in Nova Scotia than housing crisis: providing emergency shelter to the hundreds who need it across HRM before winter hits.

> The government's introduction of Bill 329 is of grave concern for our caucus and should be for all residents of HRM. It gives the Housing Minister sweeping authority over development in the city, overriding decisions made by mayor and council. It also allows developers to have direct access to the Housing Minister, rather than following the existing planning process. The government has a pattern of rewarding friends of the Premier, and we remain concerned about the transparency and accountability of who will be awarded development in HRM going forward, and how any of this will result in more affordable housing.

> Our main focus during the legislative session is always to stand up for Nova Scotians. This fall, our political pressure led to the government acting on three policies that were previously tabled by Liberals, including incentives for homeowners to build backyard suites, expanding cell coverage across the province, and introducing dedicated legislation to support Acadian and francophone students.

The initiative I am most proud of this session is getting a commitment from the government



to study expanding job-protected leave for Nova Scotians facing serious illness, like cancer, from three days to up to 26 weeks. The last thing someone going through chemotherapy needs to worry about is if they have a job to return to after their treatment. I am so proud of our team for championing this policy that will impact thousands of Nova Scotians and their families.

Bold action is needed to tackle the generational crises facing Nova Scotians. As Leader of the Nova Scotia Liberal Party, I am committed to bringing forward strong policies that will help Nova Scotians in every corner of this province.

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Bird Feeding with Homemade Coconut Oil Suet Rings for the Winter

ird feeding/watching is one of the most popular hobbies around the world and feeding them during our cold winter months is critical to their survival. Since berries and other natural sources of food are scarce, and with just a little help you can create a feast for them to get through those frigid nights.

This year I am going to make coconut oil suet rings. These high-energy and fat-based treats are easy to make and helps the birds to put on a little weight that helps to keep them warm. I like to use coconut oil because I always have some on hand but you can also use leftover bacon grease or lard.

To get started all you need is coconut oil or fat of choice and some tasty add-ins. Make sure the seeds and nuts are unsalted and there are no added sugars. Dried fruits such as cranberries and raisins are good and grains like oats and quinoa are also full of nutrients. A sprinkle of cayenne pepper helps to heat their little bodies naturally and stimulates the circulatory system that is beneficial to help prevent frostbite.

Begin by slowly melting the coconut oil and some unsalted chunky peanut butter for added nutrient. Then mix in your seeds, fruits, nuts and grains. I like to pour this mixture into a silicone doughnut baking mold so I can easily tie a string to hang in the trees. Pop this into the freezer to let it set.

Note: Coconut oil has a melting point of 25 degrees celsius, so these suet treats must be a winter treat only, and are best served in the shade.


If you do not have a mould another idea is to make a suet log which is also very easy to make. Find a small log or possibly a large branch 6 inches or so long and 3-5 inches in diameter. Drill random holes with a 1 inch drill bit and fill the holes with your suet mixture. Make sure to drill a hole in the top and add an eye bolt for hanging.

Making bird feeders can be as easy or as complicated as you would like it to be. There are so many different recipes online to make a variety of hanging bird seed ornaments. Try making a few different ones with a variety of ingredients and decorate a winter bird tree.

STRAW HAT BRAIDING AT ROSS FARM A LASTING & PRESERVED HERITAGE SKILL



INFLUENCES

In a book about Nova Scotian Craftspersons, the tradition of braided hats makes a shining appearance in the force of Jane Hiltz. She states that she had always heard the older residents of the area speaking about braiding hats, and decided she wanted to learn. Little did she know at the time it would become such a passion for herself.

Taught by one Mrs. Laura Veinot, Jane had started with straw hats; first learning how to grow the oats, then how to harvest, prepare, and make sure nothing went to waste. Next she learned rush hats, which she had said dries to a more lacy type of effect, making them look different to the straw hats. Lastly, the wood sheen hats, which she made by having her husband cut her long strips of yellow birch also known as sheens - which were then braided into hats. Many of the staff at Ross Farm Museum learned how to braid such hats from Jane before she passed away

CARRYING ON TRADITION

Monique Veinot, one of our on-site heritage interpreters, generally does the demonstrations for this heritage craft during special weekend events, showing how the skill can be carried on despite how long ago it was introduced to society. This was, after all, one of the many zerowaste handicrafts that still has its use today!

WOVEN HATS HISTORY IN NEW ROSS Many of the older residents of New Ross Remember when hand-braided hats were common in the community. According to Vincent Walker:

"The women used to make the straw hats - wheat straw, barley straw, braided. They'd flatten if out some way and braid it, you know, and then they'd sew it together to make straw hats. They'd be right wide with a rim onto it, and then the wind would catch it, you'd have to tie a string onto them.



Oh, we'd have a lot of fun, in them days, everyone would be wearing a straw hat, and we'd by haying, and the wind would catch it and take it half way across the field or down the fence!'

MATERIALS

There are two main materials in making woven straw hats: straw, usually from rye, but also from wheat, barley, and oat; and yellow birch sheens, which were strips of yellow birch, produced by a process called "sheening."

MAKING THE HAT

The hat is sewn with the beginning of the braid as the center of the crown. The braid is stitched in an ever-increasing circle, overlapping and sewing through the two layers. Traditionally, the women used flax thread that they grew and spun themselves. Today, a heavy weight of beige polyester or cotton thread is

The braid itself is elastic and can be pushed together or "fulled in," to differing degrees before stitching in order to create either a rounded or flat crown. Similarly, the braid can be stretched to create the bend from the top to the sides of the crown, and from the crown to the rim.

Usually the rim is doubled because it receives the most wear. As well, a band of material is sewn inside the hat at the base of the crown so that the hat doesn't stick to the wearers head.

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Health & Wellness Age 8 is the BEST!

In the same way that vision screening identifies sight problems, that if not treated, could lead to irreparable complications in the future, orthodontic screening provides the same value for your child's bite. Children's growth allows for a unique opportunity to correct problems during childhood that with maturity are difficult to correct without surgery.

The longer I practice as an Orthodontist, the more I realize the confusion that exists around orthodontics. Too often, I find myself educating parents about orthodontic screening when it is already too late to benefit their child. Commonly I hear "We wish we had known earlier." and those are the most frustrating words to hear when we as Orthodontists know how easy it would have been to avoid. If you have a child that is eight, have them screened, get the information and then make your decision. Information is key. Timing is key.

Here are the Facts you should know:

Age 8 is best.

Canadian Association of Orthodontists recommends that every child be seen by an Orthodontist by the age of 8. At this age the adult teeth are just beginning to erupt and an Orthodontist can already tell the way a bite is developing. It is rare for any treatment to be recommended at this age, but to gather a baseline is crucially important to determine ideal timing of future treatment, if needed. Furthermore, there are a few select bite problems that must be treated before all of the adult teeth erupt. This is also a good age to introduce children to appliances that they may require such as thumb habit breaker appliance or expander.

Every person deserves the right to see an Orthodontist.

Every person, regardless of age, has the right to have their bite and smile evaluated by an Orthodontist. Although a dentist can assess your bite, an Orthodontist studied dentistry first and then studied an additional 3 years to become a specialist. Like all specialists their practice is solely focused on one thing and an Orthodontist is focused on growth and development and treatment of the bite. You trust your heart health to a cardiologist and your skin to a dermatologist. Similarly an Orthodontist is the person most qualified to evaluate and treat your bite. Your Orthodontist will work with your Dentist to ensure the best overall outcome for you or your child.

No referral is needed.

You do not need a referral from your Dentist to see an Orthodontist. We are happy to discuss your orthodontic concerns, whatever your age.

Orthodontic screening programs may be complimentary in some offices. It is our shared belief that any barriers to accessing orthodontic information should be removed and that early detection of problems is important. As such, we offer

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
a complimentary orthodontic screening program for all children until the age of dental maturity at which time if treatment is not indicated, there is no further obligation.

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
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
