Asperger Syndrome

Dear Parents,

Some time ago, I wrote an article about dysgraphia. Now I'm writing about Asperger syndrome because the daughter of a long-time friend was just diagnosed with this disorder as a young adult. This young lady is intelligent and aware enough to seek help, learn about, understand and come to terms with her diagnosis. She referred me to an online StatPearls Publication by S. A. Hosseini of Kern Medical Center and M. Molla of Kern Medical (2025) and I supplemented that with Wikipedia and other online sources.

There's a great deal of difficulty to systematically describe psychiatric disorders especially in children and adolescents. Asperger syndrome is a diagnostic label used to describe a neurodevelopmental disorder characterized by significant difficulties in social interaction and nonverbal communication, along with limited, recurring patterns of behavior and interests.

It has been combined with other conditions into autism spectrum disorder. Though characterized by reduced social communication and interaction, it is also categorised by average or superior intelligence, and no significant language delay as may occur in autism. Its causes may be due to genetic and/or environmental factors.

What does it mean to be diagnosed as an adult with Asperger's and would an earlier diagnosis have changed anything? Medical specialists and psychologists stress the need for early diagnosis and intervention for any troubling behavioral disorder in order to promote healthy child and adolescent development. Since early intervention did not occur in this case what are we left with? The adult must then take charge and manage many things for herself.

Perhaps generations of adults have had some degree of undiagnosed Asperger's that went untreated yet many of them went on to lead productive lives. But is that the best we can hope for? While labelling something may point in the direction of pragmatic changes to alleviate negative symptoms and associated difficulties, labelling can also scar by pigeonholing and stereotyping. But psychological assessment is recommended for treatment planning as it aims to helps identify an individual's areas of strength and weakness as a start.

Professional help can offer therapies, some of which are nowadays controversial, designed to manage effective intervention programs for children and life-skill strategies for adults. Where deficits in an individual's communication abilities, sensory, and motor skills impact to impair daily functioning, practical strategies to remedy these can be developed and implemented.

There is no easy answer to complex human developmental issues. Intense focus on specific interests in children may sometimes impede wider learning abilities. For adults, practicing communication skills to establish meaningful relationships among peers and to advance vocational and/or academic skills toward suc-



cessful work and career aspirations and experiences are essential goals for autonomy and self-sufficiency. Among other things, I suggested to my young friend to find a sport that she enjoys to increase her physical activity. Since then, Canada's red and white maple leaf flag has become a symbol of the common values of equality, freedom and inclusion that unite all Canadians.



War Amps key tag mailing celebrates 50 years of CHAMP

s The War Amps begins to mail key tags to residents across Canada, it is also celebrating 50 years of its Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program, which supports young amputees thanks to donations from the public.

Gabriel Ferron-Bouius, 21, is a right leg amputee who grew up with the support of the CHAMP Program since he was born, including financial assistance for artificial limbs, peer connections through CHAMP events and so much more.

"I had never met anyone else who was an amputee until my first CHAMP Seminar. There, I met older Champs that I could look up to and who showed me that my amputation didn't have to limit what I could do. I learned to walk by watching Champs like me and learned all about life as

an amputee," Ferron-Bouius says. "Now that I'm older, I get to pass this knowledge along to the younger Champs I meet. I would not be the person I am today without the support of War Amps donors."

The Key Tag Service is a free key return service for Canadians that generates funds for The War Amps many programs, including CHAMP. Since amputee veterans started the service in 1946, it continues to employ amputees and people with disabilities and has returned more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys to their owners.

Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox in Canada, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.



Straight teeth without conventional braces? What you need to know!

ou have probably heard that there is a different alternative to conventional braces when it comes to straightening teeth! Invisalign has become a household name for magazines, TV shows and among the many adults and teens who sport them. But although many people can tell you they are familiar with the term; few people understand exactly what Invisalign is and how it works.

Invisialign is a brand name for a clear aligner product that aligns teeth. Invisalign works by having the patient wear a series of clear aligners, in sequence, that gradually guide teeth to their ideal position. Small, tooth-colored attachments are often temporarily bonded to teeth that have especially difficult movements. These discreet attachments aid the aligner in distributing forces to the teeth so that the proper movements are achieved.

Although the technology has been around since 1999, recent years have shown major advances in improving the product resulting in widespread use of Invisalign and other clear aligners as an alternative treatment modality for patients seeking to improve their smile. But buyer beware, all clear aligners are not the same. Plastic quality varies between manufacturers and discount options do not include attachments on the teeth, which limits the amount of movement that can be achieved. Furthermore, software limitations mean an Orthodontist is best equipped to engineer your Invisalign plan to ensure your best outcome.

If at your initial consulation your Orthodontist recommends Invisalign, the next step is to obtain a 3-D virtual model of your teeth. Although traditional molds of your teeth can be made, digital scanners offer a more accurate method for capturing your bite that avoids any impressions. Before your custom-made clear aligners are manufactured, your Orthodontist must use software to manipulate your bite in virtual reality until the perfect result is achieved. This step is the most important one as your Orthodontist's knowledge and expertise of this technology is paramount to the quality of your result.

Historically, Invisalign treatment was limited to simple crowding and minor bite issues. Orthodontists now have the opportunity to do further training on advanced Invisalign techniques, which means many challenging bite problems can now be treated with Invisalign. Many patients that have previously been told they are "not an Invisalign candidate" are now finding that they in fact are! Check with your Orthodontist as to their experience with Invisalign. If that doesn't have you excited, Invisalign users are now benefitting from new technology that uses some AI to track wear and fit of the



aligner, ensuring your smile outcome is just as your orthodontist designed it!

Finally, Although Invisalign traditionally was for adults-only, it is now available in an Invisalign teen product and can even be an option for younger children. If you or your child are looking for an alternative to conventional braces, ask your Orthodontist if Invisalign or Invisalign teen is right for

The Debate: Phonics vs. Whole Language

eading instruction falls into two categories: phonics and whole language. Phonics teaches children to break words down into sounds, or "phonemes," which are then blended to form words. This method mirrors how children naturally learn language: by listening, distinguishing sounds, and eventually combining them to create meaning.

Whole language, on the other hand, treats words as entire units to be memorized rather than broken down. However, this method can be confusing for young children. Imagine trying to memorize thousands of words by sight alone! This approach can feel counterintuitive for children, relying on memorization instead of comprehension.

WHY PHONICS WORKS

Phonics aligns with the way kids naturally learn language. By understanding that words are made up of individual sounds, they develop the ability to decode new words. This gives them the tools to tackle unfamiliar words independently, boosting their reading confidence.

Phonics also encourages precision and persistence. Rather than guessing a word's meaning, phonics encourages children to "sound it out." This skill translates into better problem-solving and critical thinking abilities in reading and other subjects.

WHY WHOLE LANGUAGE **FALLS SHORT**

The whole language approach can limit a child's reading progress because it relies on memorizing entire words rather than breaking them down into sounds. While this method can help children recognize a few familiar words, it doesn't equip them to decode new words independently.

Whole language often encourages guessing based on pictures or context, which can lead to frustration as texts become more complex. Without the tools to sound out new words, children may struggle, impacting both their reading skills and their confidence. Over time, this can diminish their interest in reading altogether.

Phonics provides children with a roadmap for understanding words logically.

By learning to break words into sounds, young readers gain the skills they need to read independently, building confidence, independence, and a true love for reading.


