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Learn a Second Language

If I could go back and redo my formal education, in addition to trying harder at maths and science, I'd really buckle down and learn a second language. It would probably be Spanish because French was not offered to me in high school. Ten years ago, I spent a year trying to learn a second Language—German. It wasn't easy and I didn't fully succeed. In fact, I wrote a book about that humbling experience.

In an article entitled "Quebec's New French Revolution" journalist Mark Mann writes about his experience as an Anglophone, who has always loved French, living in Montreal. He uses his experiences as a segue into the complicated historical relationship English speakers have as Montrealers living in the Province of Quebec.

Montreal is a special cosmopolitan city in a French-speaking province where people from many different countries around the globe populate to live and speak a variety of languages. Mann points out it's important to be able to speak French there.

For Anglophone Canadians, the second most obvious national language to acquire is French. I think of it as a gift English-speaking parents can give to their children. There are many positives to learn-

ing French even if the goal is not to live in Quebec.

What are the benefits of being bilingual? Generally accepted benefits include: improving children's brain and memory functions, boosting their creativity and self-esteem, helping them in their career opportunities, as well as increasing their understanding of the language they already speak.

If you don't use it, you lose it. This is true of muscles as well as language facility. Getting kids interested in French, providing structured learning opportunities, and regularly exposing them to it sure help. As supplementals, reading French books, watching French movies, and knowing and conversing with French speakers build and extend brain and memory functions for retention. Here's an interesting phenomenon that I've noticed: whenever I'm introduced to a new word or idea, within the next day or two, it pops up in my reading or conversation. Language learning works this way.

Children love to show off new knowledge and giving them a chance to learn and demonstrate new words and phrases is a surefire way to boost their motivation and self-esteem. Career opportunities are not top priority for five or ten-year-olds, but this is the payback investment that comes much later in life. English-speaking students who learn French, come to understand that about seventy percent of all words in their first language vocabulary resemble French words. Knowing French therefore greatly enhances the comprehension of written English.

The average child can learn a second language well. As parents, my husband and I wanted and could support this at home but could not do it ourselves. So, we were happy to enroll our son in late French Immersion and our daughter in CSAP schools. Our son did okay, and our daughter flourished. She went on to study in at a university in Quebec City, eager to keep up her second language and her view of what being a Canadian means. Another benefit not spoken of often enough is the nation-building function of shared languages.

Even though my language learning experience in Germany failed miserably, I wouldn't want to go back and rescue myself from it.

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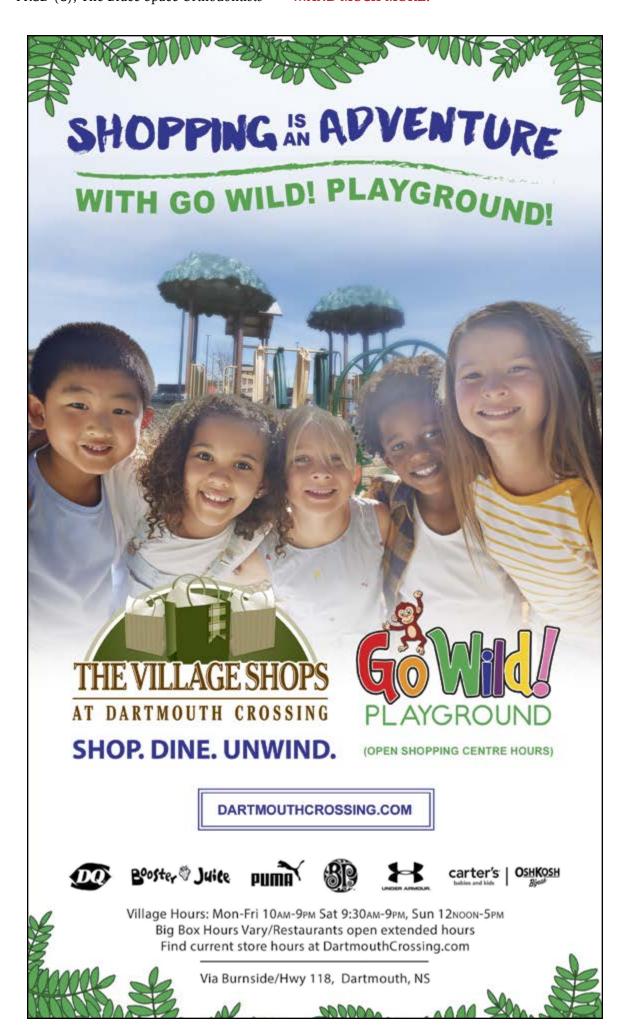

Canadian brewers are source of pride for communities and play an important part in supporting local economies. To support their operations, our government has decided to extend the cap on the excise duty adjustment for beer, wine and spirits, effective April 1, 2024.

Additionally, for two years, we are cutting the excise duty by half on the first 15,000 hectolitres for all Canadian brewers, providing a typical craft brewery with up to \$86,952 in tax relief.

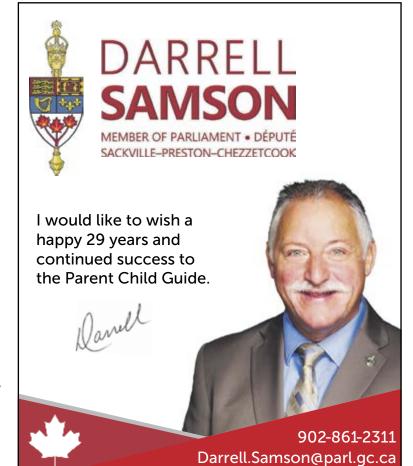

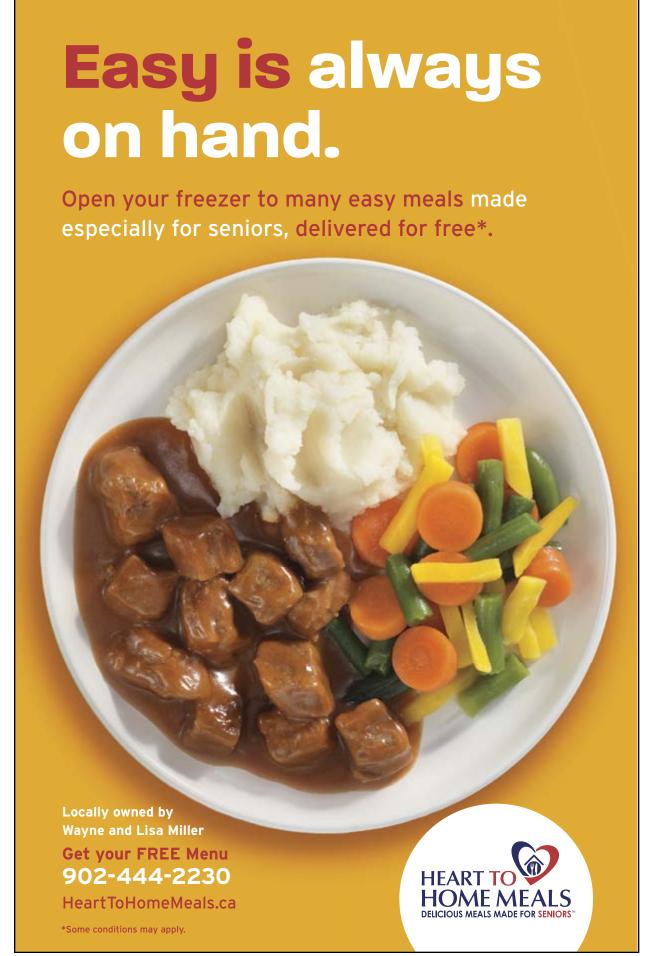
> From 8:00AM to 2:00PM, domestic burns are not allowed on any day during the wildfire season. As for after 2:00PM, restrictions are updated every day. Depending on the risk,

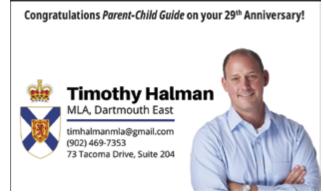
there are three possibilities.

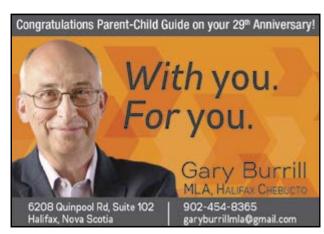
On days of least concern, NRR will allow burning from 2:00PM to 8:00AM. On days of moderate concern, burning will have to wait until 7:00PM, and on days where the highest risk is present, burning will not be allowed.

Each day at 2:00PM the daily restrictions are updated. These restrictions are broken down and specialized by county, so please check what restrictions are in place for your specific location.

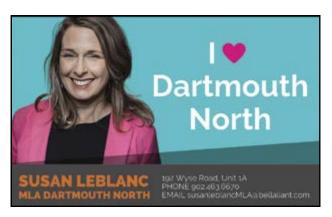
I highly encourage you to check these restrictions before proceeding with any campfire, or any other kind of open domestic burn. These restrictions are in place for the safety of all Nova Scotians, to prevent as many wildfires as we can.

Not only is the guide a wealth of knowledge and useful information for families and people of all ages, but it is free. Keep up the great work. Your community loves you and values your ongoing service.

As the MLA for Bedford South, one of my most important roles is to advocate for good public policy.

Since introducing legislation on this in October 2022, I have been advocating for a residential tenancies enforcement unit to better protect both tenants and landlords. This commonsense approach is supported by both landlords and tenants and would mean disputes are resolved faster, with less cost and organization on both sides. I am asking the government to take action on this and make a difference in the ongoing housing crisis.

In early March it was announced that our district will be home to The Mill Cove Ferry Terminal and a new, environmentally friendly, high speed ferry service for travel between Bedford and downtown Halifax, with the first sailings planned to start in 2027-2028. This is a transformational investment for Bedford South and beyond, and a prime example of what can be accomplished when all levels of government work together to achieve big things. I have been advocating for this project since before I was elected, but there are so many more who have been working on this idea for decades.

I am extremely happy that this critical and long awaited for funding of the sensor-based Continuous Glucose Monitoring (CGM) supplies will be available through a new income based program and existing pharmacare programs. This will be open to Nova Scotians with Type 1 and Type 2 diabetes who meet specific criteria, including the need for multiple daily injections of insulin or insulin pumps to manage their diabetes. This is such great news that more Nova Scotians living with diabetes will soon be able to better afford the equipment and supplies they need.

We are running the free tax clinic again this year through my constituency office, until the end of April. It's best to call or email to arrange a time to drop off your tax documents.

My office and I are always here to help you in any

way that we can. So please feel free to reach out. As always if you know of anyone celebrating a special occasion or if a new business is opening up, please let us know so we can share their great news with everyone.

Bedford South and area have many wonderful diverse cultures and traditions. So, let's share in some of these with our neighbours and friends. Enjoy our beautiful Spring season and I hope many of you are able to get out and about to participate in the many activities organized throughout our communities or to just be out in nature.

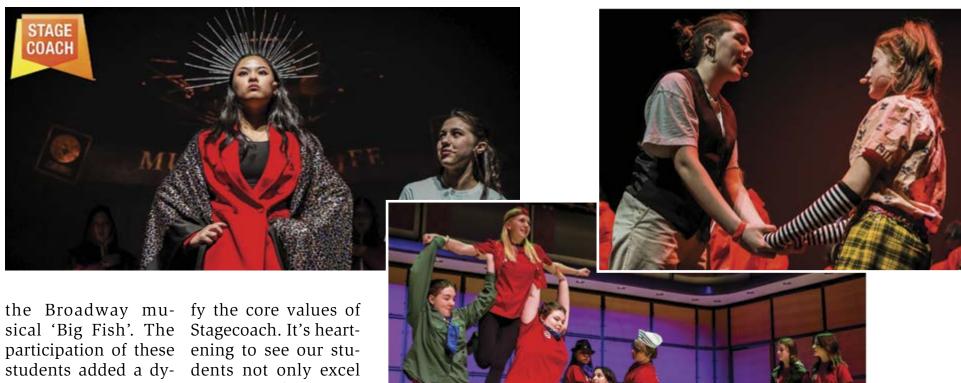

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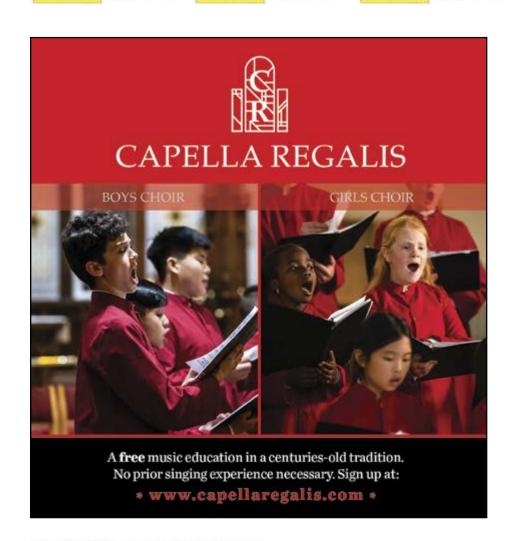

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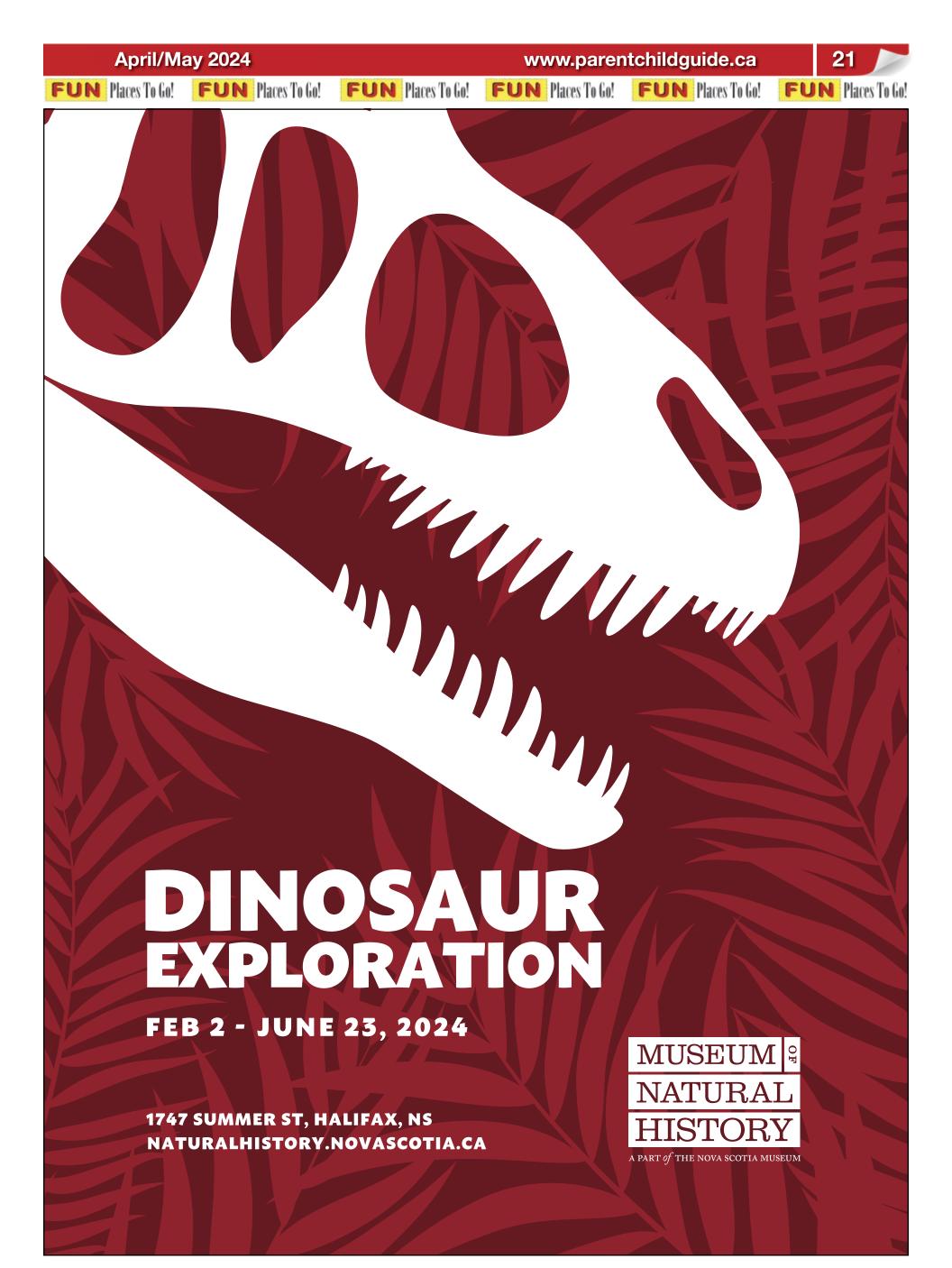
