
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Report Cards

hat's the purpose of report cards? Over several decades, I dealt with them in different roles. I read, composed, and interpreted them as a student about me, as a teacher about my students, and as a parent about my children. I still keep a treasured copy of my own ancient school report booklet used between 1968 and 1974. Back then, the comments summed up "unsatisfactory", "satisfactory", "fair", "good", "very good", or "excellent" achievement. Of course, additional comments related to my behaviour, attitude, and aptitude. My parents looked quickly at the marks, read the flattering or unflattering subject-teachers' comments and took what the teachers wrote as truth. They asked few questions of me, none of the teachers and expected no conversation with educators as no tradition of parent-teacher interviews existed back then in Barbados. With our children the situation was very different except for their piano lessons reports which often read: "Fair effort. Keep at."

Over my period as teacher and parent, school reports big changes came to elementary, junior high, and high school reports. Assessment of student-achievement changed to become outcome-based. What is outcome-based assessment? This brand of assessment measures student progress towards specific learning outcomes. There is a belief that each student is unique and experiences success in different ways or on a different timeline compared to others. The process of gathering evidence on learning based on the number of learning outcomes

achieved rather than the sum of marks on different assessment tasks is more important.

In schools, actual marks became less significant and grades or grade-bands were substituted for percentages with mixed teacher and parental reception. Still, parents knew if their children achieved A's in most subjects they were doing fine; whereas, if they received mainly C's and D's, no matter what the paragraphs next to those grades said, achievement fell below par or was unsatisfactory.

Let's get back to the question of why report cards. A school report is a written account from a school about how a child is doing in their classes. It assesses their performance and provides a valuable tool to parents, students, and teachers. It shows what learning is being assessed and if the student is below grade level, at grade level, or above grade level. As teachers we were increasingly reminded: "Let there be no surprises, especially unpleasant ones, for parents." It meant we were required to communicate with parents, particularly if students were underperforming, well before report cards reached home. Parents with some prompting, and consequential action at home could encourage their children to talk with their teachers, up their effort, and hand in homework or late

When there's a big disconnection between how students are doing in school and what parents know about how they are doing, then there's reason for teacher-parent-child dialogue. If that fails, then the midterm re-

port is clarion calls to action. Much can be achieved between midterm and end of term, semester or year-end, and the three parties can work together to achieve specific improvements. I've witnessed amazing progress triggered by candid midterm reports numerous times over the length of my career. Report cards are a great utility tool even if their reform marks a radical change from how parents and teachers experienced them as students.

What is the FHSA and how does it work?

What is a FHSA?

The Tax-Free First Home Savings Account (FHSA) is a savings account meant for home purchases. It's a new registered plan that'll allow first-time homebuyers to save up to \$40,000 tax-free. This new account is expected to be implemented in 2023, but there are still some unanswered questions about the details.

Here's what we know so far:

- Age limit: You should open your FHSA before reaching 71 years old or can be opened for 15 years.
- Contributions, deductions and taxes: Unlike an RRSP which allows contributors within the first 60 days of the following year, all your FSHA contributions should be make before December 31 for current year deductions.
- Deduction can be carried forward to future years to reduce taxable income.
- Once the account is opened, unused portions of the annual contribution limit will be allowed to be carried forward up to \$8,000. This means that an individual who makes less than \$8,000 in contributions in one year could contribute the following year, their annual contribution limit of \$8,000 plus \$8,000 minus their contributions made in the previous year (subject to their lifetime contribution limit).

How does it work, and what are the financial advantages?

The FHSA is a mix between an RRSP, a TFSA and the Home Buyer's Plan (HBP).

Like an RRSP, your contributions are tax-deductible, so you'll be able to reduce your taxable in-

come when you file your tax return. However, unlike the RRSP where your withdrawals are taxable, withdrawals from the FHSA to buy a home won't be taxable.

Like the TFSA: Investment income isn't taxable (if it's used to buy a home).

Example

If you contribute \$8,000 per year to buy a home, it's the equivalent of the government offering you a non-taxable gift.

Unlike the HBP, you don't need to pay back the amount, even if the withdrawals are not used on a down payment for a home. However, those withdrawals will be taxable.

Good to know

If you decide to use this amount for something other than a house, you can transfer the money to an RRSP or RRIF without affecting your contribution room.

Should I wait for the FHSA before buying a home?

Considering the account won't arrive until 2023, and that annual contributions are capped at \$8,000; it's strongly recommended that you start saving now using a different savings account like a TFSA. However, if you want to take advantage of the HBP, you'll have to use your RRSP.

Can I combine the HBP and FHSA to help me buy my first home?

Yes. You can combine the HBP and FHSA to buy the same property.


New Home Heating Grant

MP Report: Investing in a Stronger Halifax West

s your MP, I spend a lot of time listening to community members about the projects they envision that will make Halifax West a better place to live. My goal is always to find a way for the federal government to help these ideas come to life. Over the last few weeks, I've been proud to share news of \$918,000 in federal investments towards community projects that will support the cultural, economic, and social development of our riding.

For the 17,000 + residents who rely on the Fairview Resource Centre to access everything from housing support to parenting programs, I was excited to share some big news: By working together, we have secured \$446,000 in funding for renovations that will improve the organization's capacity and make their space more welcoming. This work includes the addition of a lift that will make their community kitchen and second-floor programs accessible to more residents. The work

will also increase the building's energy efficiency, ensuring a comfortable environment for all who appreciate this important community fixture.

For over four decades, social enterprise Stone Hearth Bakery has been providing valuable training and opportunities to underrepresented members of our workforce. Through a recent \$172,000 investment from ACOA, Stone Hearth has been able to upgrade their baking equipment. This support will help them expand their clientele and support even more employment opportunities for those who need them. Today, Stone Hearth has grown into one of the most advanced bakeries in the city, and I'm proud to say that almost a quarter of a million dollars in investments from our federal government have helped support their success.

For many spectators in Halifax West, the Bella Rose Art Centre is where arts and culture come alive. Each year, the theatre allows countless residents and



many others to showcase their talents

I'm thrilled to share that ship with community organizations in we are investing \$300,000 through the Canada Community Revitalization Fund to support upgrades to the centre's audio and lighting systems. The Subcommittee of the Whole House on Supply considers the other estimates referred to it by the Committee of the Whole for a maximum of forty hours.

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
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FUN Places To Go!





How Personalized Learning Helps Students

s personalized learning the key to helping struggling students succeed?

Unlike the traditional teaching and learning model, personalized learning puts students in the driver's seat of their own learning. Traditional teaching and learning centre around a one-to-many model with one teacher for many students.

Most parents will have already experienced the struggles connected with the traditional model. In a large group of students, is it possible for every student to be able to learn at the same pace as the rest of their classmates? The answer is no.

In the traditional classroom, an otherwise bright student can miss a concept and fall behind. This can create a cycle of poor grades and low confidence that can be challenging to overcome.

By eliminating the one-size-fits-all approach, personalized learning programs focus on student individuality. Rather than leading a group of students through the same exercise, the personal approach allows students to take control of their learning, with their needs, skills, and interests guiding the pace and intensity of their education.

There are three main factors guiding a student's personalized or customized programs:

Customization: whether it is reading a Shakespearean novel or completing a unit on fractions, customized learning programs help students reach a specific goal using their unique learning needs. Spring Eggshell Planters

am so "egg-cited" that spring is just around the corner! I start saving egg-shells sometime in February in preparation for egg decorating season. Besides decorating eggs for the spring season with the pysanky technique I thought it would be fun to use some of the shells for seed pots and to add an extra bit of spring decorating.

Eggshells are the perfect size starter cups for seeds. The calcium carbonate and nitrogen in the shells will also help nourish plants as they start to break down in the soil.

You want a good size cup, about 2/3 or 3/4 of the shell. Start by gently cracking an egg at the narrow end and pulling away the top. Poke a small hole in the bottom half of the shell with a nee-

dle and wiggle it around to create a drainage hole. Wash and dry the shells thoroughly to kill off any bacteria.

Fill each shell 3/4 of the way full with dampened seed starting soil mix. After adding the soil, follow the instructions on the seed package for planting depth. Gently sprinkle a bit of potting soil over the top of the seeds to cover. Generally, you want to leave soil somewhat loose on top of the seeds. Give each cup a light watering with a spray bottle and put the tray on a sunny windowsill. It is important to keep the potting soil moist without over-watering. Use a spray bottle to spritz the seedlings every two or three

Use a marker to write the name of the plant on the eggshell for reference. You can also simply decorate the shells before you plant in them for a pretty display.

These eggshell planters are so cute once the seeds start to sprout. If you want to make a display in time for an event or occasion you need to check the label on the seed packet for days to germination and count backward. If the packet says they will germinate in 10-14 days it means you need to plant the seeds at least two weeks, or longer, to make sure you will have seedlings popping up to give as little gifts at your springtime gatherings.

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
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War Amps 2023 Key Tag Mailing Begins in Nova Scotia

The War Amps begins its 2023 key tag mailing to Nova Scotia residents this month.

Eight-year-old Abel Walker was born missing the lower part of his left arm and is a member of The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program.

In the letter accompanying the key tags, his parents Cortney and Ryan describe how The War Amps has supported their family. "We enrolled Abel in the CHAMP Program when he was only a few weeks old. The support and strength of the CHAMP community was undeniable and truly heartwarming. As he has grown up, being a part of CHAMP has helped him feel secure in himself and his abilities. His prosthetic arm and device that The War Amps funded allows him to do everyday tasks as well as play sports."

The Key Tag Service was launched in 1946 so that returning war amputee veterans could not only work for competitive wages, but also provide a service to Canadians that would generate funds for the Association. The Key Tag Service continues to employ amputees and people with disabilities and has returned more than 1.5 million sets of lost keys to their owners.

Each key tag has a confidentially coded number. If you lose your keys, the finder can call the toll-free number on the back of the tag or place them in any mailbox in Canada, and The War Amps will return them to you by courier, free of charge.

The War Amps receives no government grants and its programs are possible through public support of the Key Tag and Address Label Service.



Good Dogs Make Good Neighbours!

■he Canadian Kennel Club encourages all dog owners to participate in the program known as the Canine Good Neighbour Program (CGN). The program enhances community awareness of responsible dog ownership and the benefits associated with dog ownership. Canine Good Neighbours can be counted on to present good manners at home, in public places and in the presence of other dogs. This helps ensure that our companion dogs are welcomed and respected in our community.

The test is not a competition but an assessment of the handler and dog's relationship together along with the handler's ability to control the dog. Dogs are evaluated on their ability to perform basic exercises as well as their ability to demonstrate good manners in everyday situations. There are 12 steps to the assessment and include the dog's ability to walk through a crowd, accepting a friendly stranger's approach to the handler, the dog's reaction to a passing dog and more. The training is fun, rewarding, and useful—helping the dog owner have a better relationship with their dogs. It is open to both purebred and mixed breed dogs.

Locally, training classes are periodically available and CGN testing by an approved evaluator is offered several times a year. It is anticipated that training and test opportunities will increase as the program is attracting more interest in our area.


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
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
